GET NARCAN TRAINED

Naloxone is a medication that can reverse the effects of an opioid overdose. First responders, law enforcement officers, and school nurses carry naloxone, and training is available to members of the community. If someone is struggling with an opioid addiction, family members and loved ones can get educated on appropriate naloxone use and have it ready to prevent a potential overdose. Get trained and get a prescription. Narcan can be bought, without a prescription, at your local CVS and Walgreens.







Seaford Goes Purple is an initiative from the Sussex County Health Coalition with support from Highmark and DSAMH.


The purpose of the project is to promote the "new conversation" —one that includes prescription drugs.


